THE GOLDEN SPIKE MADE THE NEWS AT THE ROSE PARADE

Well not in the best way. The 150th anniversary of the Golden Spike ceremony comes this May. Huge celebrations are planned, highlighted by the first operation of Union Pacific's #4014 Big Boy. As

most remember, the Big Boy was transported from Los Angeles to Union Pacific's shops in Cheyenne for work to return it to steam operation. So, in addition to the National Park Services anniversary events, perhaps overshadowing all will be seeing not only UP #844 in steam, but the return to steam of a Big Boy.

So, when it was announced that the Union Pacific Railroad and the Chinese Heritage Association were sponsoring a float in the Rose Parade, many of us got up early on New Years to watch for the float.

Never made it, or at least we did not get to see it! Of all the floats, it broke down and had to be towed before reaching the reviewing stand. But the Hallmark network cut off the parade at the end of its alloted time slot. Here is an article from the **LA Times** about the event:

A float malfunction caused a traffic jam at the Rose Parade on Tuesday morning.

The Chinese American Heritage Foundation's train float was disabled by a small fire and was towed for the rest of the Rose Parade route, according to Cheryl Moody, a commander for the Pasadena Police Department.

The float, which depicted the moment when two locomotives met face to face upon completion of the Transcontinental Railroad, was wreathed in smoke near where the parade began on Orange Grove Boulevard. Those onboard were able to extinguish the fire quickly before evacuating the float, said Pamela Knapp, chair of the parade's float entries committee.

A tow truck tried, and failed, to pull the 95-foot float onto a side street. Several floats and bands were backed up behind the disabled float. Spectators, believing the parade to be over, began spilling onto the parade route. A band tried navigating around the stranded float and ran into the crowd milling about the route.

"Worst impasse I've ever seen at the Rose Parade," said Los Angeles Times photographer Mark Boster, who witnessed the jam.

Eventually, organizers were able to clear the route "like Moses parting the Red Sea," Boster said. The floats and bands backed up behind the Chinese American Heritage Foundation float were able to finish the parade. As of 10:45 a.m., a tow truck and a semi tractor were attempting to transport the disabled float down the rest of the route.

Descendants of the Chinese, Irish, German, African and Mexican laborers who built the railway were aboard the float, called "Harmony Through Union." "Everything we do is built by humans," said Knapp, the float committee chair. "You plan and you plan, but sometimes things go wrong."

Editor's Note: Fortunately both halves of the float did not suffer damage and were on display following the parade. The last two photos show how beautiful they were and probably would have been the hit of the parade - had they been in it!


LIONEL HISTORY PAGE

As observant readers of the Main Line have noticed, I have been publishing pages from the Lionel inhouse employee magazine, All Aboard. I enjoy getting an insight as to what life was like at the Lionel factory and some of the unique things relating to their product were described.

Well, I've decided to take a break from that and share another fascination I have with Lionel history, its paper products. I have collected any items Lionel published for many years. One of the fun pleasures of that is, along with other "paper collectors" is seeing how new products are described and in particular how newly designed items are not always shown as they actually were made. In this case, we often compare the advance catalog, published for the trade, with the consumer catalog.

But in this case, I am going to compare two consumer catalogs - the 1950 Golden Anniversary catalog with the "Sorry" catalog. You may remember that demand for the regular catalog was so great, Lionel ran out and published a later catalog titled "Sorry". It was of a completely different format - all black and white, using photos, and not



containing much of the early pages of promo items, and of a totally different page layout.

But, what makes it interesting is that, since it was published after the consumer catalog came came out, theoretically the depictions of pieces newly introduced would be more accurate. Not necessarily so.

So, what I have done is to compile a list of what differences and errors I have found in each catalog. They could be in either or both. And what I would like you to do, if you have these catalogs, is to do the same and see if you can find more than I have.




