

OLD BUSINESS:

John Draftz, Rich Fortmeyer, and Bill Richardson managed to go through all the debris in the storage locker. Whatever they determined we didn't need was put up for sale. We sold \$144.00 worth of stuff at the April 20th mini-meet. The plan is to attempt to sell more at the Summer Cactus meet.

The April Mini-meet went very well. There was only 1 table that we didn't fill. The mini-meet raffle made about \$127.00. We will continue with the raffle and the Fall mini-meet as long as it makes money. Consensus is that we should always hold a quick GCMR membership meeting before the mini-meets.

So far the fabric garage at Adobe Mountain is doing well. It has survived our recent wind storms.

NEW BUSINESS:

Planning for the "Beat The Heat" meet up in Prescott is progressing. We have reserved a 40 passenger bus with a washroom from Arrow Stage Lines for \$900.00. We will also have V.I.P. entry into the meet for those on the bus.

Summer Cactus table sales are at about 1/3 sold so far. John Draftz has sent letters to several railroads asking for ride tickets. He expects we will have about eight different railroads at the swap meet to raffle.

Bill Richardson reported that we were able to perform some mobile trailer maintenance on May 4th. The vehicle to mobile trailer electrical connector needed to be replaced and wired correctly. Also, on the layout itself some train accessories were incorrectly wired to the "O" gauge track. This was also corrected. Some things needed glue, others just needed cleaning. In any event we're in much better shape now. Thanks to all who lent a hand.

Janet Mattern reported that the mini-meet went very well. Seemed like we had a good crowd. Only one empty table remained. Also, the raffle did well. The club made money and it's free to members. Sounds like a win-win situation. For future mini-meets we will try to always have a short club meeting before we open the doors.

NEW BUSINESS:

Glenn Saber reported 55 of 152 tables for the Summer Cactus meet are sold (36%). John Draftz reported that we have some of our raffle prize railroad tickets already, but we are still waiting for Durango Silverton and the Cumbres Toltec. John is expecting at least eight different railroads in our raffle.

We have reserved a 40 passenger bus with a washroom for the Prescott "Beat The Heat" meet on August 17. There are some V.I.P. perks this year. No standing in line. There is a special door to let bus riders in as soon as doors open and will be hassle free for bus riders who will have a special badge. To accomplish this the pick up points will be 1/2 hr earlier than in the past. Contact Dave Brown if you want to ride.

need to go to the hobby stores and to the other train clubs.

Add a train swap meet and events in the area, the Beat the Heat Swap Meet should be hard to pass up. Our folks at the Central Arizona Model Railroad Club are already working to lay out the red carpet for you for a day of trains as well as a vacationing trip to the North Country.

Now is the time to mark August 17th on your calendar. We again will be at the Air Conditioned, ground level hall of the Liberty Traditional School in Prescott Valley. It is right off SR69 in the heart of town. If you have been to the PV Event Center, the school is right to the east of it. There will be signs on RT 69 directing you right to the school.

Sales tables are sold out, so we know you will have a great selection of trains. Admission is \$5 with kids under 12 free with an adult. The show starts at 9am and runs to 1pm. Even though the meet itself is in Prescott Valley, you still have a tremendous variety of activities if you would like to spend a weekend in the Prescott area. Here are some of the weekend's activities around the Prescott area.

<u>Shopping</u> - Downtown Prescott has one of the finest antique and arts districts in the state. The district lines Cortez and Marina Streets, north and south of Gurley.

Museums - Just north of Gurley is the Smoki Museum of Indian Art, while on Gurley is the Sharlott Hall Museum of local and Arizona history. Just north of town on SR89 is the Phippen Art Museum, one of the finest Western Art museums in the country. And brand new is the Prescott Western Heritage Foundation at 156 S. Montezuma located in an outdoor courtyard right on Whiskey Row.

<u>Train Rides</u> - Both the Grand Canyon Railway and the Verde Canyon Railroad are less than two hours from Prescott for a great Sunday trip activity.

Outdoor activities - The Prescott area is a jumping off point for camping and fishing in the Bradshaw Mountains, bike riding on many of the area trails and hiking in Thumb Butte, Granite Mountain or the Peavine Rails to Trails. Lynx,

Watson and Goldwater Lakes are great picnic locations.

Mortimer's Farm - Mortimer Nursery Farms located at the intersection of SR69 and SR169, will have a crop of corn and other fresh grown goodies ready for you.

Open Houses - The Prescott area is home to a number of home layouts and we are happy to share some of the best with our visitors. For this year, we have six CAMRC members who have generously opened their layouts and collections for your enjoyment. Time for visiting starts at 2pm, after the meet. There will be maps available at the meet registration table. Be sure to pick one up on your way in.

<u>Richie Scanapico</u> - An outdoor Large Scale layout surrounding two sides of his house with trains running in a setting offering spectacular views. In addition there is a display of large scale military trains in his garage.

Peter Atonna - A full basement high rail layout with an urban theme and a downtown featuring two midrise towers. To celebrate this year's Golden Spike celebration, I will be running UP 4014 and UP Northern #835. If you are overnighting on Friday and would like to visit, please let me know.

<u>Donn Pease</u> - A full basement HO gauge layout based on the Southern Pacific in southeastern Arizona. Much scenery is completed and has a artist painted backdrop.

Scott Hicks - Extensive Large Scale garden layout in the landscaped backyard of a beautiful near downtown Prescott Victorian home with an O gauge layout running in the guest house.

Walt Bouman - Raised level backyard fully landscaped outdoor G gauge layout. It is 1940s to 1970s era theme with both steam and diesel trains running.

<u>Mark Ziven</u> - Basement high rail layout, fully sceniced with open pit mine and industrial area highlights.






