#### **Old Business**

Scottsdale's Rail Fair is Saturday & Sunday, 8-9 October, from 10-5. The mobile layout and the module trailer will be brought out Friday afternoon the 7<sup>th</sup>. George Bean and John Draftz will provide

the prime movers. Set up will be Saturday morning at 8. Everyone who can come out to help is encouraged to do so. We will also need help Sunday afternoon at 5pm for tear down. Bill Richardson has

personal issues that won't let him be present thus limiting the S-gauge commitment. It was decided that for RailFair and the Adobe swap meet the following weekend we would only use the mobile layout and the O-gauge modules.

The Sahuaro Central swap meet is Saturday, October 15th, at Adobe (43rd Av & Pinnacle Peak) from 10-2. The mobile layout and the O-gauge modules will be set up as per previous meets. Members who can help are asked to be there not later than 8 am. A little earlier would be nice. The MLS pancake breakfast (donations accepted) begins about 7:30 and is open to our members. That third weekend is the MLS fall meet. There will be public rides during the swap meet and Sunday afternoon.

Cal-Stewart will be Friday through Sunday, November 25 -27. We're planning to take the mobile layout. Members planning to go are George Bean, Dave Brown, Bill East, Bill Richardson and Glenn Saber. Since that's the third weekend, we wouldn't have the mobile layout available at Adobe. An alternative would be to set up the O-gauge modules. This issue needs to be resolved at the October meeting.

The TCA Turkey Meet is Saturday, November 26th, from 9-3. If the mobile layout can 1) get in the building and 2) open so as not to be a fire hazard, it will be brought to the Chapparal Suites the Friday afternoon before. If the mobile layout isn't an option, we will have to use the O- and S-gauge modules only. We are still waiting details on the Methodist church use of the mobile layout and/or our modules in December. If they also need it Sunday, it would have to be the 10<sup>th</sup> & 11<sup>th</sup> due to the Christmas party on Sunday. George will contact the church to clarify dates and times.

Glen presented additional information on false fronts that are intended to go on the layer of the mobile layout.

#### **New Business**

Our November meeting is planned for the 12<sup>th</sup>. There may be a TCA conflict. We should know by our October meeting.

Glenn reported on the September 18th mobile layout operation at Adobe. There were issues with rust on some of the track along with electrical issues. Glenn and Bill Richardson were able to get most of the trains operating. Part of the problem was that the layout hadn't been operated in several months. There was discussion about buying a waterproof tarp that could cover the layout when not in use to minimize the adverse effect of any rain we might get. No decision was made.

Although one person can work the layout using museum staff to help open and close the wings, Glenn said that two members would be better. George will check with TCA to see if they have

members who would like to operate their trains on Sunday afternoon thus providing "bodies" to help with operations. John Draftz donated another gateman for the layout. George displayed a Halloween gateman.

Glenn indicated that there was plenty of time between visitors to where members could work on the layout. George is planning to have a run log with the layout so that problem areas can be noted and thus worked on. Appropriate tools to work on the layout should be stored in a tool box with the layout. Also, the museum staff may be able to provide other support as needed.

Dave and Glenn will staff the layout October 2nd Wayne will staff it November 6th, and John Draftz will staff it December 4th. We still need someone for first Sundays in 2012.

#### **WEATHERING IT OUT**

(Bruce was kind enough to let us reprint an article he wrote on his weathering techniques. Here is part two of the article. - Ed)

Dry brushing is also a good method to bring out small details the might need to stand out. This could be details like levers, gauges, valves and instruments. I know that a lot of modelers like to use bright silver paint for this, but I find that changing up the dry brush color to give those details some definition. I like using bright silver for items in the sun and a gun metal or aluminum for items that reside more in the shadows. The method is the same as loading up a wide flat brush then removing all of the wet paint from the surface of the brush. I like a metallic for dry brushing because the pigments in the paint are larger and reflect light better with less material being added to the model.

The next step in giving models realism is to achieve that broken in look. We weather a moving object differently from buildings and ground effects. Both objects have will have streaks and drips however only one will have the effect of motion. Buildings as they age will first lose their shine then fade in color. This means for something to look old all bare plastic needs to be covered with a dull coat. Then a coating of fine white mist applied onto roofs and chimneys. The next weather effect will be peeling paint especially on the southern exposures of the building.

Paint chips are usually uneven blotches that uncover weathered wood. Weathered wood looks a darkish gray to black in color. Remember to maintain scale so keep the chips very small, usually no larger than the hand of your figures.



The last step for weathering is water damage. This could come from eaves, gutters and around porches and stoops. In most of the country water is hard and dries to a white chalky color. So I use a white pastel chalk applied with a brush that I have trimmed very short and stiff. Using a piece of sandpaper I rub the chalk into a fine power. Applying with the brush and a little force put the water stains on the building. One last detail which takes a little more skill is that the edges of the water stain might have a fine line. I use a very fine graphic pencil to apply this detail. One last thing to remember about weathering buildings is that if the building is occupied, the windows will still be shiny. Rather than mask every window over and over again, I apply Future floor wax onto the windows as the last step. Laying the building flat I apply the Future and let it wash into the window. Do not move the window until the floor wax dries. (This does not take long)

Vehicles are more fun to whether because the effects can give more realism and hide so many imperfections at the same time. Cars, trains, trucks, airplanes and tractors age very differently. Cars that are on the road may lose their shine and have some and rust but are merely dirty. Trains in service are affected by soot, smoke and water stains but most are well cared for and rarely look shabby. Trucks on the other hand are working tools that get dirty and





muddy, with dents and rust. Lastly tractors get muddy to the point of having cakes of mud and will be also dusty.

My favorite medium to weather vehicles is dry pastel chalk. I can apply dirt streaks and mud blotches and also can lighten or sun fade roofs and hoods. Black chalk can be used to apply smoke streaks from exhaust stacks and vents. A coating of dull clear coat applied with a fine mist will lock the details in if the model is handled.



Use weathering sparingly; you do not want vehicles that look like they are going to fall apart at a stoplight to be in your set. I also like to have a small junk yard to showcase my weathering failures. A failure for the road might be a success in a junk yard. Also make sure to weather all of the items in a set to the same level as wear and tear as possible. Unless a building is absolutely new, (have building materials around) give each building the same treatment to let

each element blend into the next. Give your viewer the effect that they are in an airplane taking a scenic flight over your hometown.
