#### MINUTES

The Meeting was called to order at 10:04 AM at Our Saviors Lutheran Church by President John Draftz with twelve members present.

Treasurer Glenn Saber reported the PayPal account was zeroed out and transferred to the checking and three CD's. Member John Kendig asked treasurer, Saber, about the safety of the three CD's in light of the current banking news. Glenn reported he felt they were safe because we had three small separate accounts, and each was FDIC insured.

President Draftz made the following announcements:

Fall Cactus is 80% sold out. He will need help at 4:00 PM on Friday September 22. Table sellers will be admitted to the hall when the setup is finished at 4:30. The hall will close at 6:00 PM and reopen Saturday morning at 6 AM. The swap meet opens to the public at 9:00 AM and closes at 12 noon with a tabletop auction to follow shortly after.

Rail Fair is a week early this year and will be held on Saturday September 30 and Sunday October 1. The trailer will be dropped off on Friday afternoon. Setup will begin Saturday morning at 7AM. Rail Fair hours for the public are 10:00 AM until 5:00 PM both days and volunteer operators are needed both days.

The club will set up two portable "Kids Modules" on Sunday, October 29 at the Life in Christ Lutheran Church, 14802 N. 75th Ave in Phoenix as part of the church's community outreach "Trunk-or-Treat" event. The scheduled time for the event is 5-7 PM. Volunteers are needed to help set up and run trains. The Arizona Railway Museum will host a one day Fall Railway Day at the Museum on Saturday, November 11. The club will have the trailer on location with setup beginning at 7 am. The event is open to the public from 9:00 am – 4:00pm with free admission. Volunteers are needed for this event because there are two other model train events going on in the Phoenix area that day.

The Educational Segment was kicked off by Glenn Saber showcasing his MTH replica of the original Lionel train, the #100 motorized gondola. Glenn had it running on 2 7/8" track and showed some of the ties and explained how difficult it was to set the rails into all the wooden ties without splitting them. The train runs on D.C. and he went on to explain finding a transformer that would not pop the overload when running it. It made several successful trips around the track to everyone's delight.

The Educational Segment was the Guess the Temperature competition with a large turnout of nine members participating. Just about every degree between 95 and 107 was chosen.

+ Mike Darus who had a Lionel 6-9510 Pennsy Mail Car and entered with the number 95. His strategy was to be the highest without going over.

+ Janet Mattern with her Lionel 6-16974 Marvin the Martian Box Car and entered 97.
+ John Draftz had an American Flyer 989 Box Car and entered 98.

+ John Kendig had a nice Southern Pacific 4449 and then told the tale of being in Phoenix in 1976 when the Freedom Train was parked at ASU. Several longtime Phoenix residents mentioned that event and retold their own stories of the Freedom Train visit to Tempe. + Chris Allen had a lowly Marx 347100 NYC gondola and entered the number 100. Glenn Saber had a Standard Lines standard gauge NYC Box Car with road number 101.

+ Terry Haas also had a Freedom Train HO Car that carried the road number 102.

+ Bill Lazenby had a K Line Westinghouse caboose in blue that matched his Schnable cars with a road number of 104. + Katie Elgar was the most heat weary of all saying the June heat is going to last until Halloween and had a Menards M&M Box Car with a 107 road number.

President Draftz again reminded that the next three months will be very busy and asked everyone to please consider stepping up and helping out at least at one event.

#### New Business

John reminded those present that the October Meet will be the Annual Drag Races. There will be three classes that members can enter, slowest, stock out of the box unaltered, and modified. It is always a fun event and bragging rights to the winners of each class.

Both noted the extra non-club members help that was available from the Boy Scouts and how organized everything seemed to run.

Janet Mattern and Glenn Saber gave reports on the Mini-Meet held in July. The unusual July heatwave might have been a contributing factor for the less than expected turnout of sellers and buyers. Janet mentioned that most table sellers did quite well despite the lighter crowd and it was decided to do the event again next summer.

John mentioned that in cleaning out the storage locker there was a collection of twenty+ VHS tapes from the lending library we once had. After a short discussion it was decided to put them on the "freebie" table at the Fall Cactus and any leftover would be donated to a charity.

Bill Lazenby gave a quick update on fellow member, Dana Price. Bill stated he continues to be in good spirits. Those present shared a story of Dana's smile (and good luck at raffles) and all present are hoping for the speedy recovery of our close friend and his return.

### WAKE UP MAGGIE, IT'S TIME TO PLAY WITH TRAINS

Seventy years ago, a British schoolboy was enthralled by the railroad outside his bedroom window and dreamed of the model train set he wanted for Christmas. His father gave him a guitar instead.

In later years, that guitar and his trademark gravelly voice made the schoolboy into an international pop music sensation. This past August, Phoenix classic rock fans of "a certain age," to be diplomatic, were able to see the now 78-year-old (but "Forever Young") Rod Stewart in concert at the Footprint Center.

However, only the most ardent fans know of the passion he shares with many of us, also "of a certain age." For that British schoolboy never forgot model railroading, and rock stardom gave Sir Roderick David Stewart, CBE, the resources to build a layout that we mere mortals can only dream of.

The layout, which Stewart named the Grant Street and Three Rivers City Railway, is a



fantasy American city of the 1940s, based on vintage images of the New York Central and Pennsylvania railways. It took him 23 years to build, working backstage between sets and

in hotel rooms while on tour, but in November 2019 he revealed it to the public in a cover story for *Model Railroader*, all 2,800 square feet of it.



According to *Model Railroader*, Stewart would request a large table in his dressing room when touring so that he could work on buildings and other scenery for his layout. He also had a fan installed so that glue fumes would not affect his voice, not that anyone would necessarily notice.



But he never drank before working on his layout. "I can't build after a couple of glasses of wine - the results are never good," he said.

A few months before the *Model Railroader* feature was published, Stewart publicly demonstrated his love for the hobby when a

small British model railway club in Lincolnshire was vandalized one night by a quartet of juvenile delinquents who destroyed an exhibit the club had set up in a school gymnasium.



Saying that he "felt the pain" of the club members, Stewart led a fundraising effort to replace the lost collection, personally donating £10,000 and encouraging fellow rockers Jools Holland and Roger Daltrey, also model railroading fans, to pitch in. They raised a total of £70,000, or \$87,500, for the club.

During the Pandemic, Stewart arranged to ship the layout from his U.S. residence in California back to his home in Essex, England. It was a monumental operation to dismantle the layout larger than a substantial Phoenix ranch house and ship it in pieces over eight months, at a cost of \$90,000, in time for Christmas 2021. He got the Christmas he wished for after all.

### AT LAST THEY GET IT

Lionel, in the mid 50's, decided that kids buying their trains wanted more than just playing with miniatures of the real trains outside their windows. So, Lionel began introducing more fanciful models, including cold war related rockets and ammunition dumps; a beautiful Civil War era steam train, and cars that were "fun" cars where a giraffe ducked his head to go under a bridge, a sheriff chasing an outlaw around boxes in a gondola. But perhaps the climatic moment came when a "cattle" car was introduced with "horses" heads bobbing in and out of the car. It was insanely popular and even in the 60's continued in the line. And it is still issued by the current Lionel. But, oh how did the scale folks laugh at us! "Playing with toys, I see". "Wait, make sure the doors are closed, your "horses" might get loose. Oh I see, you cannot even open the door!"

But wait, guess what the scale folks have just discovered!









